Signature Scholarships

The students we accept gain admission to many of the best schools in America. Those schools possess large endowments, completed infrastructure and often have been in business for hundreds of years.

In spite of the intense competition we face, and the fact that we are still a work in progress, every year CNU is selected by outstanding students. When we are able to provide scholarships we balance the playing field and prevail against the finest public and private schools. Let me give you two examples.

Our freshman class includes 40 Canon Scholars who earned, on average, a high school GPA of 4.26 and a 1350 SAT. Canon Scholars participate in the <u>President's Leadership Program</u>, receive a merit scholarship of \$5,000/year and the opportunity to study at Oxford. This important program is funded by Canon USA and Canon Virginia and we are most grateful for that strong and generous support.

The freshman class includes 91 Smithfield Goodwin Scholars with an average GPA of 3.96 and a 1276 SAT. Smithfield Goodwin Scholars receive a scholarship of \$2,000/year, an additional \$2,000 stipend toward foreign study, and participate in the President's Leadership Program.

Forbes Hall Phase II



The addition to Mary Brock Forbes Hall is now open. The new wing adds 44,000 square feet of classrooms, laboratories and a vivarium, an interactive learning laboratory where students will conduct hands-on science by raising animals and plants for observation and research.

Phase II provides dedicated teaching and research labs for our faculty, enabling them to expand the focus of their experiments and provide more undergraduate research opportunities.

CNU offers a unique chance for students to pursue cutting-edge investigation. At other institutions these opportunities are reserved

for graduate and post-doctoral students.

With the opening of this remarkable facility, we greatly advance CNU's development as *the* place for undergraduate research in Virginia.

Spring 2013 Career Fair



On January 31, more than 400 CNU students attended the Center for Career Planning's Spring Career and Graduate School Fair. Ninety-one organizations (including 14 graduate schools) were on campus to promote internships, full-time employment and graduate degree programs.

This year, 30 CNU alumni represented their organizations at the fair. Not only were they promoting employment opportunities, but they were also giving back to their alma mater by talking to current students and sharing insights from their own career paths.

The men's and women's indoor track and field teams are off to a strong start in 2012-13, earning high marks in the first regional rankings for the year. Both squads are ranked #1 in the south region and are preparing for conference and national meets.

The women's team has seen outstanding performances in the distance medley relay where two freshmen, Lydia Cromwell and Melissa Rizor, and two sophomores, Jessica McClelland and Enuma Ezenwa, have teamed up to drop the school record by 20 seconds. Freshman Jenny Westerholm has also distinguished herself early in her CNU career and is currently ranked eighth in Division III's pentathlon.

The men's team has registered performances this season that rank in the top 10 all-time at CNU. Senior Ray Gamache now ranks third in school history in the 3,000-meters while freshman Josh Showalter holds the eighth best mark in the same event. The teams will return to the track for the Mason-Dixon Indoor Championship in The Freeman Center on February 16.
