MEMBERSHIP BENEFITS

Each member may attend all of the Monday afternoon lectures and Wednesday field trips and may select one Tuesday or Thursday afternoon course in each of the two five-week sessions. Registration for these courses will be accepted on a first-come, firstserved basis and will be limited to 35 students per course (10 in word processing). The membership fee for the 1989 fall semester will be \$50 per person. Waiver of this fee for economic reasons can be arranged on an individual basis. There will be a modest additional charge for the optional activities.

Membership orientation for the 1989 Fall Program will be from 2 to 3 p.m. on Wednesday, September 13, in the Anderson Auditorium of the CNC Administration Building. Persons may join the ELS and register for courses at this time if they have not previously done so. Further details regarding the program and optional activities will be announced. SESSION A COURSE DESCRIPTIONS

Courses meet 2:30 - 4 p.m. Locations to be announced.

"Acting as a Process" - Tuesdays, Sept. 19 - Oct. 17

Dr. Bruno Koch, Professor and Director of Theater Arts and Communication at CNC, will trace the conceptual and performance considerations in building a character and ensemble in the process of acting. This course covers the dimensions of acting, text analysis and interpretation.

"The Informed Traveler" - Tuesdays, Sept. 19 - Oct. 17

Coordinator Keith McMurran. Members of the society will share their experiences in both domestic and foreign travel. This will include both independent travel and Elderhostel travel and will encompass India, China, Australia, Italy, and a presentation of "Gardens of the World." This course will include advice from a local travel agent on planning travel. In addition, our official ELS photographer, Lee Montgomery, will give advice on improving travel photography.

"The Word and the Spirit in the Colonies and the New Republic" - Thursdays, Sept. 14 - Oct. 12

Dr. Alfred Millar of CNC's English Department will bring warmth and humor as he presents a survey of religion in early America with a focus on the genre of spiritual autobiography. Course topics include: "What Was the Bible Used by the First American Settlers?"; "Pilgrims and Puritans: Welcome to Northern Virginia"; "A Significant Start for Virginia: Smith and Byrd"; "Jonathan Edwards: America's Greatest Theologian"; "A Quaker and a Deist: Woolman and Franklin."

"In Appreciation of Music" - Thursdays, Sept. 14 - Oct. 12

Dr. James Hines, Chairman of CNC's Music Department, will trace the stylistic development of music as a universal language from the Middle Ages to the present, with emphasis on the major works of the great composers from each period.

SESSION B COURSE DESCRIPTIONS

"Art - Treasures & Trivia" - Tuesdays, Oct. 24 - Nov. 21

Professor Betty L. Anglin, CNC's Fine Arts Department, will offer perspectives and insights regarding significant periods of world art and specific artists from prehistoric times to the present. This course will include such topics as: the Ancients; Medieval and Renaissance periods; 19th Century - Post Impressionist Era; modern and contemporary art; and Neo-Realism.

"Our Peninsula's Past Revisited " - Tuesdays, Oct. 24 - Nov. 21

Coordinator Daisy McMenamin. Local historians will share their research with the class. Course topics include: "A Historical Overview of the Lower Peninsula" by Dorothy Duffy; "Peninsula History Through Family History" by Virginia Rollings, Director of the Family History Center in Denbigh; "George Benjamin West: A Newport News Pioneer" by Parke Rouse; "The Military and Hampton Roads" by John Quarstein, Director of the War Memorial Museum of Virginia; and "The Peninsula and the Newport News Shipyard" by Dr. James Morris, CNC Professor of History.

"Beginning Word Processing with the Apple Computer"-Tuesdays, Oct. 24 - Nov. 21

Instructor Irvene Seney, ELS member. This course will introduce word processing to persons who know how to type, but who know nothing about computers. In five hands-on lab sessions, you will learn how word processing can greatly enhance your writing efficiency and even make writing a pleasure. Before printing a document (be it a family letter, article, or short story) you will see what you have written on the computer screen and will be able to make changes and corrections by retyping only the changes themselves, not the entire document.

wed Sept. 13 SESSION B COURSE DESCRIPTIONS (Continued) "Changing Life Styles" - Thursdays, Oct. 19 - Nov. 16 Professor Emerita Ruth Kernodle will examine changing lifestyles as the result of changes in men/women relationships and from the "sexual revolution." Topics will include male/female relationships, the sexual revolution and the impact of this on the family, alternatives to the traditional family and reasons for this, and divorce with its implications for lifestyle. "Myths to Live By" - Thursdays, Oct. 19 - Nov. 16 Dr. Richard Beauchamp, CNC Philosophy Department, will explore the role of mythology in giving form to several important areas of living such as love, self-exploration, and war and peace. Perspectives on the influence of scientific thought on mythological thinking and the importance of rites and rituals and distinctive mythologies of eastern and western religions will be reviewed. Joseph Campbell will be our guide through his book, Myths to Live By (available in CNC Bookstore for \$5). "Beginning Word Processing with the IBM-PC Computer" -Thursdays, Oct. 19 - Nov. 16 Professor Jim Moore, CNC Computer Science Department, will conduct this course. The description is the same as for the "Beginning Word Processing with the Apple Computer" course. The IBM-PC will be used. Provision for disabled available upon request. EEO/AA Any questions?
