to think critically, finding creative solutions to problems while at the same time expressing themselves through their art and individuality as artists. The studio art program offers low faculty-to-student ratios, quality mentorship, the ability to explore independent artistic interests and opportunities to exhibit work both on campus and beyond. Our majors have gone on to careers as professional artists, graphic designers, gallery managers and teachers.




Art history is the study of the history and development of the visual arts, including painting, sculpture and architecture. Students in the art history program enjoy in-depth courses in the history and development of art and visual culture. The emphasis in the program is on scholarship and research. We encourage students to take internships in galleries and museums. Recent students have engaged in internships at the Mariners' Museum, Newport News Public Art Foundation, Peninsula Fine Arts Center, Chrysler Museum of Art, Smithsonian National Museum of African Art and the Phillips Collection in Washington, D.C. Recent graduates have pursued graduate study in both MA and PhD programs in art history, museum studies, library science and conservation.



PLANS UNDERWAY for New Fine Arts Center at Christopher Newport University Christopher Newport University Rising next to the Ferguson Center for the Arts is the spectacular new Christopher Newport University Fine Arts Center. Opening in early 2021, the Center will house exhibits from around the world as well as galleries and studios for our students, faculty and community. It will be the place where all of the visual arts including painting, sculpture and photography come to life. The beautiful entrance pavilion will connect to an expanded colonnade, part of the original design as envisioned by I. M. Pei. It will feature a dramatic 4-story glass lobby reminiscent of the billowing sails of a ship and will be lit night and day. Inside and out, the new Fine Arts Center will be a work of art.









Ceramics Studio

- Classroom space for fabricating medium-tolarge hand-built and wheel-thrown clay forms
- Pottery wheels, pug mill, pneumatic extruder, slab roller and wedging tables
- Kiln room housing large oxidation kilns and a professional clay mixer with vent hood

Digital Arts Lab

- Courses and facilities supporting digital photography, graphic design, digital fine art imaging and printing, and digital video
- Sixteen Mac workstations, Adobe Creative Suite, and the latest graphics and video authoring software
- Sixteen high-definition digital video cameras, professional-grade mounts and microphones, and the latest video editing tools and software
- Museum- and professional-grade printing hardware and software

Painting/Drawing Studio

 Features a dual-purpose working space with easels, painting storage and figure drawing platform, and large drafting tables and matting equipment

Photography Studios

- · Digital and traditional darkroom photography
- The latest in digital imaging software and processing techniques used in commercial and conceptual fine-art photography
- Digital and standard SLR cameras available for student check-out

Printmaking Studio

- Classroom space for creating relief, intaglio and contemporary lithography prints
- 39.5" x 72" Takach relief press
- 24" x 36" Takach tabletop lithography press
- Large flat-file storage systems, large-format drying rack system
- Hollander beater papermaking system

Sculpture Studio

- Classroom space for 3-D design, as well as additive and subtractive sculpture
- All-room dust collection, air cleaning and pneumatic system
- Floor model tools such as an industrial table saw, industrial band saw, horizontal sander, vertical and disc sanders, drill press, and thickness planer
- Studio toolroom housing a variety of electric hand-held tools and supplies
















