3. What are the objectives for this program?

See attached program mission, goals and objectives. Please note that this program also answers to a national accreditation body, the Council on Social Work Education.

4. For whom is the new curriculum primarily intended? Explain why it should become part of the curriculum, and how this proposal relates to the University's mission.

These changes are being made to accommodate the new university curriculum and will become effective for students entering the University in Fall 2006 who are majoring in social work. Additional changes to the major were made to strengthen several other areas and especially to respond to the younger full-time cohort of students who now populate the university and the major. These changes include moving major content into the sophomore year (previously devoid of major required content and leaving majors without contact with the department); adding a junior field placement as part of the Social Work Practice I Lab class and moving it from 2 to 3 credit hours; adding an additional credit to Social Work Practice II to allow better coverage in this class of content on both work with groups and with families; teaching our own Human Behavior and the Social Environment classes to replace Psyc 210-211, SOCL 201-205, Hlth 200 and SOWK 406 that had been required in the past; dropping requirements SOCL 303 (Family in Transition) and and instead recommending this course as an elective; dropping the requirement for SOCL 316 Minorities in Society and adding a social work lower level Diversity/Cultural Competence class (proposed as SOWK 216); rearranging and partially renumbering our research sequence of classes to be more in line with Sociology but also to allow for the addition of a major research project as part of a newly proposed adding a senior capstone course (SOWK 498); renaming several courses to update old titles and make them more attractive to students; and finally, keeping as many electives as possible as well as keeping student choices of new A of I requirements as open as possible. All of these changes are also in compliance with Council on Social Work Education accreditation requirements.

IMPORTANT NOTE: The new curriculum can most clearly be seen in the sample track and summary document that appears as the last two pages in the attached paperwork. In addition, please see the chart that compares the old and new curriculum.

5. What is the anticipated enrollment in the new curriculum for the next three years?

Social Work majors number approximately 85. We typically graduate about 20-25 majors per year.

6. How will the new curriculum be staffed/administered?

As of August 2006, there will be four full-time social work faculty (as opposed to the Current three). This number is adequate to meet the current demand and to satisfy accreditation needs.

7. Has this curriculum, or one closely related to it, been offered at CNU previously?

If so, is that curriculum currently being offered? How does the proposed curriculum differ? When is the last term the old curriculum will be offered?

There is much that is unchanged about the social work curriculum and the old curriculum will continue to be offered in order to graduate those students who have entered the University prior to Fall 2006. Some of the new courses can be substituted for the old required courses in order to minimize the impact of having to offer two curricula at one time with a small staff. On the other hand, because the social work curriculum is carefully sequenced, most requirements can be phased in and phased out as the Fall 06 freshman class reaches them. A good example is our addition of a senior capstone course. It will not be regularly offered until the graduating class of 2010 reaches it in their last semester. For transfer students entering the major beginning next year, independent study classes may need to take the place of the capstone course, assuming the number of transfer students remains small. On the other hand, the addition of sophomore-level Human Behavior in the Social Environment courses (proposed here as SOWK 210-211), which will replace the old requirements for PSYC 210-211 and SOWK 406, will need to be offered beginning in Fall 2007. The senior level part of that sequence in the old curriculum (SOWK 406) will continue to be taught through Fall 2008.

The principle differences between the old and new curriculum are:

- Loss of the ability to require some lower-level content courses that satisfied old general education requirements and also served as important foundation content for the major. At the same time, the liberal learning area of inquiry courses in the new curriculum provide a few such requirements but allow many others to remain the free choice of our majors. Only the Natural World (requiring that one Biology course be selected) will be specified. Math 125 (Statistics) will continue to be required as part of the Liberal Learning Foundation for social work majors.

Use theoretical frameworks supported by empirical evidence including biological, psychological, sociological and spiritual views of person-situation interaction to understand individual development and behavior across the life span and the interactions among individuals and between individuals and families, groups, organizations, and communities.
- 8. Analyze, formulate, and influence social policies.
- 9. Evaluate research studies, apply research findings to practice, and evaluate their own interventions.
- Use communications skills differentially across client populations, colleagues and disciplines, and communities.
- 11. Use supervision and consultation appropriate to social work practice.
- 12. Function within the structure of organizations and service delivery systems and seek necessary organizational change.
- 13. Attain skills of leadership to be used for service to clients, the community and the profession.
