Barack Obama:

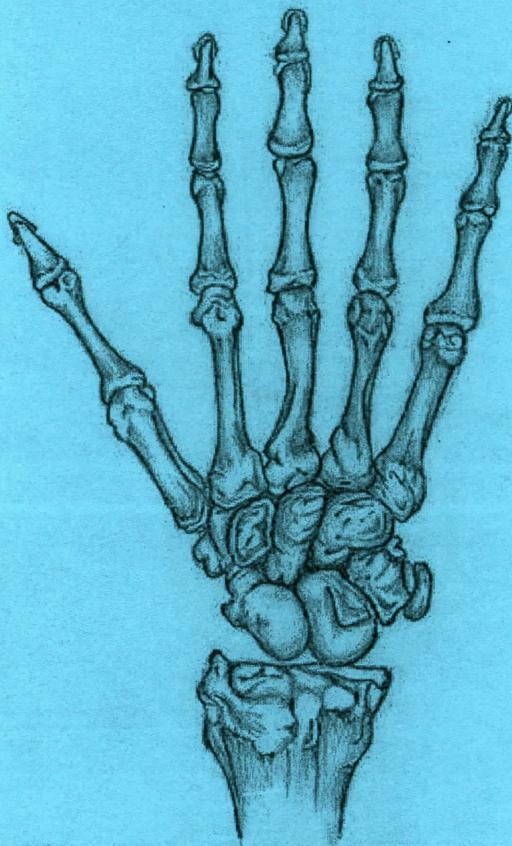

CNU Housing:

Putting Students First?

As of the freshman class of 2010, first, second and third year students were required to live on-campus unless they live with a parent or legal guardian in one of a few exempted areas. Students may request an exemption from this rule if they: are over 23 prior to Sept 1, live at home, are married, are part-time students, have a financial problem, or have a medical problem. Upon looking into this rule, the SSH has discovered that CNU has space for approximately 3,091 students.* Factoring out the commuter students, there are approximately 3,437 students between the freshman, sophomore, and junior classes that are required to live on campus on any given year. This number does not include the PLP and Honors seniors that are also guaranteed housing. There is a clear inconsistency between the number of students required to live on campus and the actual space available for those students.

To make up for some of the space, CNU has decided to double up many of the rooms in the Village and the CNU Apartments. This seems like a viable solution until the actual room sizes are considered. Freshman living in York share a room that is 11'x17', giving them 187 sq. ft. of space for the two people. This is a sharp contrast to the 144 sq. ft. of space available in the bedrooms of the Village and the Apartments.

Making the already stressful housing lottery worse was the lack of preparedness within the system this year. Certain housing options were showing up during the lottery that did not make sense. When the IT team went to fix the mistake, they were forced to pull the entire system down for maintenance. While a solution was reached, the fact this crash happened in the first place indicates a certain failure to properly prepare for the demands of the system. Adding to the general confusion of the lottery, there is an overall lack of infor-

mation about CNU Landing, specifically, but also the updated rules compensating for the lack of space this year. This includes the failure to communicate whether or not students would be financially compensated for their overcrowded living spaces, if retaining students would be given more roommates, and the failure to give students sufficient warning in order to plan their suite with the new overcrowding procedures far enough in advanced.

The issue this information raises is whether or not CNU is truly putting their students first when enacting these kinds of Housing policies. Is it in the best interest of upper-classmen to be required to not only live on campus, but within necessarily overcrowded rooms with less space than freshman residence halls? Students are told repeatedly throughout their time here that the overriding philosophy of the CNU administration is to always put the students first, and to enact policies for their benefit. What benefit is exactly gained by forcing students to live in overcrowded rooms on campus as opposed to off campus? It seems likely that these policies were enacted not for the sake of the students, but for the sake of having those students pay the school for their on campus accommodations.

If CNU truly wishes to put the students first, the administration seriously needs to consider the intent and purpose of the policies they enact. When policies such as the recent Housing changes take place, CNU students have justified cause in questioning whether or not the motto of "putting students first" truly exists.

* This number does include the new Warkwick Residence Hall, but does not include CNU Landing and Greek Village since information for Landing was unavailable. However it is very unlikely that these two compensate for the missing rooms.
