In more than 20 years as James Madison's president, Dr. Ronald E. Carrier has led the University into a place of national prominence. When Dr. Carrier assumed the presidency of JMU in 1971, he established a goal for the institution (then known as Madison College) to become a quality regional university. To achieve that goal, Dr. Carrier developed a concept of total education—where learning extended to all phases of a student's life, both inside and outside the classroom.

A multitude of changes have been made at JMU in both academic and extracurricular programs, all of them aimed at expanding opportunities for the students.

Under Dr. Carrier's leadership, \$100 million in new facilities were added to the campus. Many outstanding scholars joined the faculty, and the staff nearly doubled.

The quality of the student has increased tremendously during Dr. Carrier's presidency. Average College Board scores have increased nearly 150 points to the current average of better than 1,100.

JMU is now a thriving, multi-purpose university with an enrollment of more than 11,000.

The university has become a national leader in such innovative areas as international education, computer literacy, and the use of high technology.

Dr. Carrier has also contributed tremendous service to the Commonwealth of Virginia and its citizens.

In 1986-87, he took a leave of absence from JMU and provided vigorous and forward thinking leadership to Virginia's Center for Innovative Technology. He remains chairman of the board for CIT.

Dr. Carrier has served as a troubleshooter for several Virginia governors in a variety of

key roles and has been chairman of the Governor's Electricity Costs Commission, chairman of the Energy Advisory Council and a member of the Energy Resources Advisory Commission.


He also has served as co-chairman of the Southern Technology Council, a Science Advisor to the Governor, chairman of the Virginia Land Use Advisory Committee and chairman of the Council of Presidents of Virginia's public colleges and universities.

Dr. Carrier has received many individual honors. He is a Virginia Cultural Laureate, has been named Virginian of the Year, is a Permanent Certified Manager and has been selected one of America's Most Effective College Presidents. He was the 1991 recipient of the Martin Luther King Public Service Award and the 1990 National Multiple Sclerosis Society Silver Hope Award for the society's Central Virginia Chapter. He serves on the board of directors for several major corporations and is active in local and civic organizations.

A native of eastern Tennessee, Dr. Carrier was vice president for academic affairs at Memphis State University (1969-71) before going to JMU. He previously taught economics at the University of Mississippi.

Dr. Carrier has his bachelor's degree from East Tennessee State University (1955) and his master's (1957) and doctorate (1960) in economics from the University of Illinois. He received honorary doctoral degrees from the University of Illinois. He received honorary doctoral degrees from Francis Marion College, Jacksonville State University and Bridgewater College.

The 61 year-old Carrier and his wife Edith, have three children.
