History

Alpha Chi Sigma Fraternity was founded on Dec. 11, 1902, by a group of chemistry students at the University of Wisconsin who wanted to create an organization whose purposes were to promote good fellowship and scholarship among those in their department.

The fundamental ideals they established have remained an integral part of the Fraternity and now are manifested in our Three Objects:

- 1. To bind its members with a tie of true and lasting friendship.
- 2. To strive for the advancement of chemistry both as a science and as a profession.
- To aid its members by every honorable means in the attainment of their ambitions as chemists throughout their mortal lives.

Our past is prestigious. Not only are many of our members world-class scientists and engineers – including 21 Nobel Laureates – but we also sponsor a variety of scholarships and awards.

Our Membership

Collegiate members benefit from a local group not only to help with their studies and projects but also to participate in activities that teach the roles of leadership and management. We also provide an opportunity to create lifelong friendships with others interested in chemistry.

As a professional member, further opportunities for meeting other members can help with your employment, hiring and relaxation. Our professional members appreciate meeting others involved in chemistry outside of their workplaces and often outside of their field of work.

Purely professional organizations have their place, and social fraternities also offer much to students. But only a professional fraternity can provide college students and professionals in chemistry and related fields with the interests and bonds of a fraternity.

Since 1902, 98 chapters have been established around the country, and more than 66,000 men and women have been initiated. Now in its second century, Alpha Chi Sigma remains the nation's only professional chemistry fraternity. Its goals and ideals remain virtually unchanged, but its makeup and methods are still undergoing transmutation.
