Middlemarch, by George Eliot (the pseudonym of Mary Ann Evans), is rated by many as the greatest of the many great British Victorian novels. According to Virginia Woolf, it is "one of the few English novels written for grown-up people." A work of high realism set in a fictitious town in 1829-32 (40 years before it was

written), with a large cast of characters whose lives intersect, the novel explores the status of women, nature of marriage, problems of idealism, self-interest, religion, hypocrisy, political reform and education, at a time when sweeping technological and social changes were underway that would forever alter the patterns of daily life. Middlemarch has much to say that still reverberates strongly today. It is a long book: The first week's meeting will offer an overview of the author and novel, and we will read a quarter of the book for each of the following meetings.

In August 1914, World War I erupted between the Central Powers and the Triple Entente. President Wilson declared American neutrality on August 4, 1914. However, Germany's unrestricted submarine warfare caused a diplomatic crisis with the United States when RMS Lusitania was sunk on May 7, 1915, by a German U-boat killing 128 Americans. Germany ended unrestricted submarine warfare. By January 1917, Germany resumed unrestricted submarine warfare and sent the Zimmermann Telegram. On April 6, 1917, the United Stated declared war on Germany after the sinking of six American merchant ships and the publication of the Zimmermann Telegram. This course will discuss the rise of the United States as a world power, the rise of the military industrial complex in Hampton Roads, and the effects

Explore the 1831 Southampton County Insurrection slave uprising in American history. Nat Turner, a slave preacher, believed that he received signs from heaven, which prompted him to raise a bloody revolt on August 21, 1831. Although the revolt failed, it sent shockwaves throughout America and began the eventual steps to end slavery in the United States.


