There are no exams or grades in the courses, although some courses include assigned readings and the possible purchase of a text. All persons of

The LLS shares its program with the community by participating in joint learning efforts with other educational and research institutions, retirement groups, industries and museums and by co-sponsoring three annual conferences.



FIELD TRIP SCHEDULE

Tangier Island Friday, September 30, 2005

A perfect way to spend a fall day is on a boat trip to Tangier Island. This small island, measuring only 1 mile wide by 3 miles long, is the most remote spot in Virginia, lying 14 miles west of the Eastern Shore and 17 miles east of Reedville. According to legend, Tangier Island was discovered in 1608 by Captain John Smith and was traded to John West for two overcoats. The first permanent settler, John Crockett, arrived in 1686 with his sons and their families.

Join us as we relax and learn all about Tangier Island on our narrated 1 1/2 hour cruise on board the "Chesapeake Breeze" out of Reedville. On arrival in Tangier we will enjoy an "all you can eat" family-style lunch at Hilda Crockett's infamous "Chesapeake House." After lunch there is time to wander around the island before our return cruise.

Autumn in Virginia's Shenandoah Valley Sunday – Monday, October 23-24, 2005

There isn't a more beautiful time to travel the Blue Ridge Parkway than during leaf season! Join us for our trip to the Blue Ridge Mountains for some wonderful sights and fascinating history! Our first tour stop is historic Poplar Forest, Thomas Jefferson's country retreat and second home, which was considered by Jefferson to be "the best dwelling house in the state, except that of Monticello..." We continue on to Bedford for lunch at the Train Station, followed by a guided tour of the National D-Day Memorial. Before we complete our day's journey, we make a stop at an apple orchard for some of Virginia's wonderful fall apples, then continue on to the historic Peaks of Otter Lodge on the Blue Ridge Parkway for dinner and an overnight stay.

On Monday we have breakfast at the lodge before traveling on to Lexington for a full morning of guided tours of the city and Virginia Military Institute, including the Stonewall Jackson house, Jackson Cemetery, the Lee Chapel at Washington and Lee University, and the George C. Marshall Museum at VMI. We will enjoy lunch on historic Main Street and have time to wander on our own before beginning our journey home. We make a stop in Stuart's Draft to visit the infamous Cheese Shop. (If you enjoy cooking or baking, be sure to bring your shopping list.) We make one last stop at Richmond's Short Pump Town Center for dinner on our own before arriving back in Newport News.

After a full week, we have an early start home on Friday with stops for lunch and dinner en route.


