Resolved, First, that Chapter V, "Policies Affecting the Faculty," as approved in the August 1977 Board of Visitors meeting (Resolution 6), and as revised as Enclosure 2 in the September 1977 Board of Visitors meeting, and as amended by the Board of Visitors thereafter, is the official "Faculty Handbook" of Christopher Newport College.

Second, That the President is directed to make recommendations to the Board of Visitors on revision to the Faculty Handbook, as defined above, at the June 1981 meeting of the Board. Revisions approved by the Board shall become effective September 1, 1981 for all faculty and staff under contract for 1981-82.

Third, That Christopher Newport College shall have a Board-approved College Handbook as its official document, to contain the Board and institutional policies and procedures for faculty, students, classified personnel, and administration, and general policies and procedures. The College Handbook shall replace all other Handbooks.

Fourth, That the President shall appoint a committee of up to seven members to report to him its recommendations for the contents of the College Handbook, as defined above, no later than March 1, 1982. The President shall make his recommendations to the Board at its April 1982 meeting.

Professor Weber excels as a teacher. His student evaluations contain many very favorable comments. The

student comments and other data generated by his student evaluations indicate that his students think he is knowledgeable in his area, is concerned about his students learning, is able to motivate the students to learn, applies mathematics to everyday life situations, is unusually effective, is interested in the subject he is teaching, gives fair tests, and is, on balance, one of the best instructors they have had. His course syllabi, tests, and other materials pertaining to the conduct of his courses have generated favorable comment on the part of his peer group. In the area of community service, Professor Weber has placed his expertise at the disposal of the community through various means, including using his knowledge of operations research in doing a busing study for Hampton School System and using his knowledge of probability and statistics as an expert witness at a trial in Newport News. On campus he has organized classes in his areas of expertise, served as chairman of the Academic Status Committee, as a member of the Student Activities Committee, and as Coordinator of the Division of Natural and Quantitative Sciences. Evidence of his professional development has included the publication of three papers in 1979 and the acceptance of another for publication which will appear in 1981. In the spring of 1980 he gave a talk at the national meeting of the Operations Research Society of America; in the same year he refereed a lengthy paper for an operations research journal.

Professor Jay Snyder Paul's recommendation for tenure is based upon an established record of exceptional teaching effectiveness, appropriate scholarly activity, and service to college and community whose quality and quantity are both truly outstanding; as well as data which indicate that the needs of the College for the foreseeable future are consistent with the implications of such an award. The effectiveness of his teaching has been confirmed by student evaluations, peer visitation reports, and the syllabi and classroom materials he has created for his courses. His ten years of full-time teaching experience includes remedial, introductory, intermediate, and advanced courses; poetry and fiction writing; American literature and genre studies; a course taught at Stateville Prison, Illinois; and eight independent study projects, ranging from advanced fiction writing to methods of teaching composition. The quality of this teaching has been uniformly outstanding. Dr. Paul has been publishing poetry, fiction, and reviews in refereed journals consistently since 1969. Articles on Cooper, Goyen, and Lucien Stryk attest to his scholarship in American literature. His special interest in advanced composition has produced several papers, forums, and participation in professional meetings on the teaching of composition. In the area of service, Dr. Paul has sought out appropriate activity as the co-sponsor of the English Club and the major force behind the founding of Iota Omicron Chapter of Sigma Tau Delta, the national English honorary society, at CNC; he has organized many trips of poetry readings; and he is the faculty sponsor for Currents, the college literary magazine. He has served as a member of the American Studies Committee, the Committee on the English Core Curriculum, and the TNCC Articulation Committee, the Degrees Committee, and the Uniform Faculty Evaluation Committee; additionally, he is the Danforth

Professor Jouett Lynn Powell is a faculty member of outstanding qualities--qualities which present data indicate are commensurate with the long-term needs of his department and the College, and qualities which are consistent with the implications of his retention as a tenured member of the Faculty. His courses are topically relevant, thorough in content, and appropriate to the students of the College. The syllabi for these courses are clear and unambiguous as to the nature and content of the course, grade determinations, and assignments. Dr. Powell's student evaluations indicate that he is highly regarded by his students and that, with very few exceptions, these students are willing to enroll in his courses on subsequent occasions. Dr. Powell's research pertains to fundamental questions of relevance in introductory and methodological courses in religious studies and in the philosophy of religion. He is presently writing a book in this area, of which he has completed a substantial part. He has articles published in the series Newman Studien and in the Proceedings of the Academic Study of Religion, and is about to have an article, "The Role of Conscience," published in The Downside Review. Since coming to CNC, Dr. Powell has delivered three papers--two at the Annual Meetings of the American Academy of Religion and one at the Virginia Association of Teachers of Religion. His expertise has brought him into the local community where he has given many lectures at local churches and synagogues, gifted student classes, and at the radio interview program, Faculty Forum. His involvement in the local community

Since 1976, the Department of Management and Marketing has experienced a substantial year-to-year growth in the number of student majors, in the number of FTE students generated, and in the number of student credit hours generated. In terms of student majors (upper division FTE students), the Department of Management and Marketing is the largest department in the College. Currently, the Department of Management and Marketing is generating approximately 14 full-time faculty positions under the state's formula. This year, the Department has only eight full-time faculty; also at this time, only 35% of the full-time faculty of the Department are tenured.

Dr. Van Pelt is currently completing his third year as Associate Professor of Management and Marketing at Christopher Newport College. During his three years of service, Dr. Van Pelt has a good level of professional activity in his field, including activities in regional and national professional meetings and is currently a member of the Southern Management Association, the American Institute of Decision Sciences, and the Academy of Management. Dr. Van Pelt has contributed substantially to the instructional program and curriculum development of the Department of Management and Marketing and to the School of Business and Economics. He is well respected by his colleagues in the School of Business and Economics. Prior to joining the faculty at Christopher Newport College in 1978, Dr. Van Pelt served six years as Associate Professor of Management on the faculty of the School of Business Administration at Old Dominion University (1972-1978). Managerial experience prior to 1972 included 29 years as a Supply Officer in the United States Navy, where he obtained the rank of Captain.
