

## **Faculty Senate Resolution 2006-2007-4**

### **Emeritus Statement for Lee Doerries**

Whereas Dr. Lee E. Doerries has announced his decision to retire from active teaching and research after thirty-six years of dedicated service to Christopher Newport University, the Department of Psychology, and the academic community, and

Whereas Professor Doerries has taught thousands of students including over fourteen hundred students in his area of specialization, experimental psychology, and

Whereas Dr. Doerries has included students in his varied scholarly activities which have led to fourteen co-authored papers and nearly fifty research presentations, many of which were based on his research collaboration with colleagues at the Eastern Virginia Medical School regarding the neurological basis of anorexia nervosa, and

Whereas Professor Doerries has offered his professional services to the University and the community by his membership in countless standing committees of the University, various search committees, the Board of Directors of United Campus Ministries, the Board of Alternatives Incorporated, and as Chairman of the Department of Psychology for five years, and

Whereas Dr. Doerries' service has been recognized in his appointments as a Payton Randolph Fellow with the Tidewater Program on Ethics and Politics, a Christopher Newport Critical Thinking Fellow, a Christopher Newport College Innovative Technology Fellow and Fellow of Hampton University's Ronald McNair Program and

Whereas Dr. Doerries has worked to advance the quality of science and mathematics education in both gifted and minority youth by participating in efforts such as Project EXCEL and V-Quest, and serving as a program evaluator for Project GearUp which promotes entry into higher education by minority students, while consistently supporting community programs

to insure quality and low-cost health services for minority youth.

**Therefore Be It Resolved** that upon his retirement Dr. Lee E. Doerries be accorded the rank of Professor of Psychology Emeritus, thus ensuring his continued professional association with the University, the Department of Psychology, his colleagues and his students.
