



Bus Tour of D. C. -- "The Kennedy Years" Saturday, June 8, 2002

Board the luxury chartered coach on June 8 at **6:45 a.m.** for a 7:00 a.m. departure to **Corcoran Gallery of Art** in Washington, D. C. The bus will be in Parking Lot "S", at the back of Ferguson Hall, behind the ball field. Enter the lot from Museum Drive. Sodas, water and snacks will be available on the bus. Event is handicapped accessible.

We will go directly to the Corcoran Gallery for a self-guided tour of the special exhibit, "Jacqueline Kennedy: The White House Years -- Selections from the John F. Kennedy Library and Museum." Organized by the John F. Kennedy Library and Museum and the Metropolitan Museum of Art, the exhibit features more than 70 original and recreated costumes and accessories, showcasing clothing worn by Mrs. Kennedy on the campaign trail, during the inaugural festivities, at the White House and on state visits around the world. Documents and objects associated with Mrs. Kennedy's work on White House restoration, historic preservation and the arts are exhibited alongside the clothes she wore at corresponding events.

You will have lunch on your own in the Corcoran Café.

Next we will enjoy a guided bus tour, "The Kennedy Years." With continuous narration, we will view Lafayette Square, St. Mathew's Catholic Church, Kennedy Center for Performing Arts, Pennsylvania Avenue, Arlington Cemetery and other sites with Kennedy significance.

Depart Washington at 4:30 p.m., stopping at Pentagon City Mall for dinner on your own. Leave for Newport News at 6:00 p.m.; anticipated arrival on the CNU campus is 9:30 p.m.

The price of the trip is \$89.00 per person and the deadline for registering is **Wednesday**, **May 8, 2002.** This includes chartered coach, exhibition tickets, driver and escorts services and gratuities, and drinks and snacks on the bus. Guests may register after April 24; guests must pay 10% non-member fee.
