A Profile of the College

Christopher Newport College is a four-year, comprehensive, public, coeducational, liberal arts and pre-professional college whose primary mission is to provide quality instruction in the liberal arts and pre-professional studies.

Surrounded by McMurran and Wingfield Halls, the Administration Building, and Smith Library, the sculpture represents the three ships under the command of Captain Christopher Newport which landed in Jamestown in 1607.

Past, Present, and Future

In 1960, the General Assembly of Virginia established Christopher Newport College as a branch of the College of William and Mary, located in Newport News, and authorized it to offer a liberal arts curriculum leading to the Associate of Arts degree. From 1961 to 1969, the College matured as a two-year institution, and in 1969 it received approval from the General Assembly to broaden its role by adding upper-level programs leading to the Bachelor of Arts and Bachelor of Science degrees. Between 1969 and 1976, the College initiated three specialized bachelor's degree programs.

In its 1976 session, the General Assembly established Christopher Newport College as a four-year baccalaureate institution, independent of the College of William and Mary. The College has since implemented programs of study leading to three additional bachelor's degrees, and in the spring of 1990, the College received approval to offer its first graduate degree, the Master of Arts in Teaching (M.A.T.) with a concentration in middle school mathematics.

In September of 1961, the College enrolled an initial student body of 171 at its original location, the John W. Daniel School, a former public school building in downtown Newport News. In 1963, the City of Newport News purchased and deeded to the Commonwealth the 75-acre suburban tract which is now the campus of Christopher Newport College. Over the years the student body of the College has grown to approximately 5,000 undergraduates, and ten buildings have been erected on the campus.

The College draws most of its students from the Virginia Peninsula and the surrounding counties beyond the York and James rivers. The student body has been, and is, a blend of full-time and part-time students, degree-seeking and unclassified students, and permanent as well as transient residents of the Greater Hampton Roads.

One of the most remarkable features of the student body is the cosmopolitan flavor derived from its large number of transfer students. In the Fall 1989 semester, for example, they numbered 3,700 and represented almost 800 accredited colleges and universities - including at least one college or university in each of the 50 states and the District of Columbia.

As of Fall 1989, 140 persons held faculty positions in the 18 academic departments of the College. Seventy percent of them have earned doctorates at colleges and universities in 40 of the 50 states, the District of Columbia, and 11 foreign countries.

Christopher Newport College is a comprehensive, coeducational, urban college committed to meeting the needs of its constituencies through excellence in instruction and through public service and research. The broad purpose of the College is to be an informed transmitter and disciplined interpreter of the past and an intelligent developer of the present and future, so that its students may move toward freedom in thought and action.

The College is committed to continue its evolution as an institution for both traditional and non-traditional students, as a lifelong learning center, and as a focal point of both pure and applied research activity.

The College believes that educational growth at both undergraduate and graduate levels of study will occur as the Greater Hampton Roads emerges as one of the Commonwealth's most vital economic development centers.

Athletics

To put it very simply, the 1989-1990 academic year was the best year in the history of Christopher Newport College athletics. CNC athletes and teams accounted for an unprecedented number of awards, championships, and records, and placed the entire CNC athletic program among the best in the nation, in NCAA Division III. Among the most outstanding accomplishments:

- All but one CNC team finished with a winning record.

- CNC's overall record of 148-78-2 was the best in Virginia among all 23 Division II and III colleges, when forfeited games were taken into account.
- Individuals or teams representing seven of CNC's 15 NCAA teams appeared in national championship competition.
- A total of 12 athletes, representing seven different teams, won a total of 27 All-America citations.

- The women's track team won yet another national championship, running its streak to six consecutive titles.
- Christopher Newport College won the Dixie Conference President's Cup, symbolic of overall athletic supremacy in the conference, for the fifth time in the last seven years.

The Honors Program

The Christopher Newport College Honors Program enrolls 75 students, and its four-year course sequence offers stimulating, individualized experiences, such as:

- learning rigorous thinking and writing skills in Honors English;
- developing an in-depth research project with a faculty mentor in the Freshman Seminar;
- camping at Acadia National Park in Maine while studying plant and animal life, developing creative and descriptive writing skills, and learning logbook illustration;
- touring cultural attractions and ethnic neighborhoods in New York City;
- participating in an archaeological dig;
- analyzing the media's impact on American elections;
- pursuing independent study under the guidance of a professor in your major;
- debating contemporary economic, ecological, or political issues in a Senior Seminar.

Often interdisciplinary, Honors courses contain material not seen in other classes. Honors instructors want to know you and hear your ideas. They expect you to be active and critical, and expect to learn along with you.

Is It Worth The Work?

The Honors Program offers:

- scholarship support for all four years
- small classes taught by the finest faculty and featuring regular participation;
- the opportunity to work with highly motivated students and faculty;
- conscientious academic counseling;
- activities sponsored by the Honors Council, like forums and trips to state and national conferences;

When you graduate with an Honors Degree, your diploma will say so, and in your personal file will be a letter explaining how Honors courses make you a better thinker and writer...a better-educated and broadly qualified person.

How Do You Join?

If you are in the top 20 percent of your high school class and score above 500 on each part of the Scholastic Aptitude Test (SAT), you will be invited to join. Or, you may apply for the Honors Program during the first semester...students with a grade point average of 3.50 or above will be admitted as space permits.

Are Scholarships Available?

Christopher Newport College devotes \$30,000 annually to Honors Scholarships. Each year, 10-to-15 freshman Honors students receive \$500 Styron Scholarships (named for Pulitzer Prize winning author William Styron, a native of Newport News), renewed annually as long as students remain in good standing in the Honors Program. Upperclassmen with outstanding grade point averages receive McMurrin and *Daily Press* Scholarships ranging as high as \$1,000 per year. Full-time Beamer Scholarships are awarded to the top science and mathematics students in the Honors Program, and full-tuition scholarships are awarded annually to the top-ranking sophomore, junior, and senior honors students from the Wallace P. Greene Memorial Scholarship Fund. Forty students hold Honors Scholarships and, often, other awards as well. Financial need is not a factor in selecting Honors Scholars, and the College is committed to raising the amounts of the awards.

Costs and Financial Aid

Costs

Christopher Newport College's costs are reasonable. The quality and scope of its educational offerings are exceptional. Tuition for the 1990 - 1991 academic year, subject to change, is as follows:

Full-time Tuition

The College charges the full-time rate for students who enroll in 12-or-more credit hours during the regular session (fall and spring semesters). Full-time, in-state tuition is \$985 per semester (\$1,970 per year); full-time, out-of-state tuition is \$2,210 per semester (\$4,420 per year).

Academic Management Services (AMS) Tuition Payment Plan

Full-time students and their families may take advantage of an annual payment plan through Academic Management Services (AMS). This plan allows students to pay fees in 10 monthly payments, starting June 1, 1991. Cost of the plan is \$45, which includes life benefit coverage. There are no fees or interest charges. For details about the AMS plan, call AMS toll-free, at 800-556-6684.

Part-time Tuition

The College charges the part-time tuition rate for students who enroll in less than 12 credit hours during the fall or spring semesters, and those who attend the summer session. The part-time, in-state tuition rate is \$82 per credit hour; the part-time, out-of-state tuition rate is \$184 per credit hour.

Other Expenses

Textbooks and miscellaneous fees total about \$200 per semester. In calculating costs, travel expenses and spending money should be considered.

Financial Aid

Christopher Newport College participates in all major federal and state financial aid programs, as well as some private programs. Types of assistance include grants, scholarships, loans, and employment.

Many believe that financial aid is available only for very-low-income families, which is not true. Although most of the financial aid programs are based on financial need and are designed to assist low-income families, there are grants, scholarships, loans, and employment programs based on criteria other than financial need. The CNC Office of Financial Aid is available to serve all students and has programs to assist students from affluent families as well as low-income families.

Eligibility Information

To be eligible for all need-based programs and most non-need-based programs, a student:

- ... Must be admitted as a classified (degree-seeking) student;
- ... must be a U. S. citizen or a permanent resident;
- ... must be enrolled on at least a half-

- time basis (some programs require full-time attendance);
- ... must have financial need for need-based programs;
- ... must make satisfactory academic progress;
- ... must maintain good academic standing.

Application Information

- To apply for financial aid, a student:
- ... must complete a CNC Application for Financial Aid;
 - ... must complete the College Scholarship Service's Financial Aid Form (FAF), mail it to them for processing, and have results sent to the College;
 - ... must obtain Financial Aid Transcripts from any other post-secondary schools attended.

Deadlines

The application deadline for CNC-administered financial aid programs is April 1. The College's application for financial aid and the results of the student's Financial Aid Form must be in the College's Office of Financial Aid by April 1.

Since it takes the College Scholarship Service from four to six weeks to process the Financial Aid Form, it should be mailed to the College Scholarship Service no later than February 15.

Applications for the Pell Grant, Stafford Student Loans, Supplemental Student Loans, and PLUS loans are processed throughout the academic year. It takes from two to three months to process student loans, so the process should be started as early as possible, especially if money will be needed to pay tuition and fees.

Transfer Opportunities



Of the 3,000 colleges and universities in the United States, more than 800 are represented in the CNC student body. Seventy percent of our current student body came to the College from other colleges or universities, and 25 percent from Virginia's community colleges.

If you attend college elsewhere and are considering transferring to CNC, you should know that:

1. **you should apply early** ... although the application deadline is August 1 for the fall and December 1 for the spring, you should apply as early as possible;
2. classified (degree-seeking) admission requires an *overall* grade point average of 2.00 (C) or better and good academic standing (eligibility to return to the most recently attended college);
3. transfer credit is granted only after admission into classified status;
4. only credits from regionally-accredited colleges are transferable.

Two-Year College Transfers

Students transferring from regionally-accredited two-year colleges may transfer up to 66 semester credits. Most graduates of such colleges who hold the Associate in Arts (AA), Associate in Science (AS), or Associate in Arts and Science (AA&S) degree, and who satisfied general degree requirements similar to CNC's distribution requirements (Areas 1, 2, and 3), are usually considered to have fulfilled those requirements at CNC.

Two-Plus-Two Programs

Official agreements between CNC and several Virginia community colleges allow students who follow a pre-approved curriculum and earn a two-year degree to transfer with little or no loss of credit. Such students enter the College with junior status and may complete a bachelor's degree in two years (if full-time).

The College publishes a *Transfer Guide*, which lists all CNC-transferable Virginia Community College System (VCCS) courses

and most Two-Plus-Two programs. The *Transfer Guide* is available from CNC Admissions. Information concerning Two-Plus-Two programs is available in community college counseling centers.

Four-Year College Transfers

Students transferring from regionally-accredited four-year colleges may transfer up to 92 semester credits. The transferability of credit from technical curricula is limited, due to the fact that CNC is a liberal arts and pre-professional college.

Ordinarily, students who hold a bachelor's degree from a regionally-accredited college or university and have been admitted into classified status, transfer up to 92 semester credits and are considered to have fulfilled Areas 1, 2, and 3 of the College's distribution requirements.

Credit for Military Schools

Generally, military courses or schools evaluated by the American Council on Education (ACE) and listed in the *ACE Guide* with "upper-division baccalaureate category" credit recommendations transfer as "lower-level elective" credits.

Transfer Evaluations

Official transfer evaluations are done by Admissions soon after a student has been admitted into classified status.

Unofficial evaluations are done as a free service for prospective students who request them. Those requesting them should do so well in advance of enrolling. The eight-week period prior to each semester is usually the busiest of the year.

Visiting the Campus

Visitors are welcome to Christopher Newport College. Although an admissions interview is not a requirement, the benefits of visiting the campus and talking with students, faculty, and staff are immeasurable. Tours of the CNC campus are given by CNC students employed by the Admissions Office, located in Room 112 of the Administration Building.

If you are considering a visit to the CNC campus, please call or write to us as far in advance of your visit as possible. When you make your request for a campus tour, let us know if there are specific people or places you would like to visit. Admission to the College

At Christopher Newport College the application review process is a deliberate one, taking into consideration the fact that each applicant has talents, strengths, and abilities which make him or her unique. The College's academic programs are demanding and, therefore, the offer of admission to the College is made only after a thorough review of the application for admission, essay, academic transcript, and the results of standardized tests such as the Scholastic Aptitude Test (SAT).

Freshman Admission Requirements

For more detailed information concerning admission policies, please refer to the Admissions section of the *College Catalog*. General requirements for classified (degree-seeking) freshman admission are:

1. Graduation from an accredited secondary school or its equivalent, as shown by examination.

Since Christopher Newport College emphasizes strong academic preparation, freshman applicants will normally be expected to have completed a college-preparatory curriculum, such as Virginia's 23-unit Advanced Studies Diploma program, or its equivalent. This program requires four units of English, three units in social studies, three units in mathematics (algebra I, geometry, and algebra II), three units in science, and either three units in one foreign language or two years of two foreign languages. An overall average of "C" or better and, upon graduation from secondary school, rank in the upper-half of the class, are required. Applicants from non-college-preparatory curricula and General Education Diploma (G.E.D.) holders are admitted if they meet all other criteria for admission, including

an overall average of "C" or better in *their academic subjects (English, mathematics, social studies, natural science, and foreign languages.)*

2. Acceptable scores on the Scholastic Aptitude Test (S.A.T.) Normal minimum scores are 400 verbal and 400 mathematics.

An applicant who otherwise meets the College's admissions requirements but whose SAT verbal and/or mathematics score falls between 350 and 400 will normally be admitted, but it will be a condition of admission that the student enroll in appropriate college-preparatory courses in English and/or mathematics.

Applicants whose SAT verbal and mathematics scores fall below 350 may also be admitted. Such applicants are admitted only if, in the judgement of an admissions officer of the College, they show the potential to succeed academically. Ordinarily, it is a condition of admission that such students will be restricted at the outset to a fixed curriculum.

Special Note

Applicants who have graduated from high school within the 12-month period preceding the intended semester of entry, and who have taken no academic coursework at any other accredited college or university, will not be admitted into unclassified (non-degree-seeking) status without a complete review of the high school record by one of CNC's admissions officers. ***Such applicants will be required to meet the criteria applicable to classified freshman status.***

Applicants should also note that most state and federal financial aid regulations require admission into classified (degree-seeking) status and full-time enrollment

for most financial aid programs, including Veterans Administration and Social Security Administration benefits.

Transfer (Classified) Admission Requirements

Transfer applicants must be in good academic standing at the last college or university attended, present a cumulative (from *all* colleges attended) grade point average of 2.00 (C), and be eligible to return to the college or university most recently attended.

Application Deadlines

Although the application deadlines for degree-seeking students are August 1 for the fall and December 1 for spring, applicants should apply as early as possible, so as to take advantage of early orientation and registration programs.

Unclassified (non-degree) Admission

The College recognizes its obligation to students whose interests may not necessarily be served through immediate participation in the College's degree programs. To meet this need, the College permits such individuals, usually those who have been away from an academic environment for an extended period, to enroll under this status.

Applicants without prior college attendance must have graduated from an accredited secondary school or have earned a General Education Diploma (G.E.D.) Applicants with prior college attendance will be considered on the basis of their college records.

Unclassified students earn credit in the same way as classified students, but are not eligible for most financial aid.



Application for Admission INSTRUCTIONS

Complete and return the application for admission with the appropriate fee (\$10 for Unclassified status, \$20 for Classified status), to the Office of Admissions, Administration Building, Room 112, Christopher Newport College, Newport News, Virginia 23606-2998. CLASSIFIED (DEGREE-SEEKING) APPLICANTS: Freshman and transfer applicants and applicants holding a bachelor's (or higher) degree and who now seek another bachelor's degree must answer all questions, write an essay, complete the fee form, and sign and date the application.

UNCLASSIFIED (NON-DEGREE-SEEKING) APPLICANTS: Answer all questions, write an essay (if full-time), complete the fee form, and sign and date the application.

BACHELOR'S DEGREE (OR HIGHER) HOLDERS: If you are not pursuing another bachelor's degree, answer questions 1 through 8, 11 through 17, 22, complete the fee form, and sign and date the application. If you are pursuing another bachelor's degree, see instructions for "Classified (Degree-Seeking) Applicants," above.

RE-ADMISSION and RE-OPEN APPLICANTS: If you previously completed a fall or spring semester at CNC (this does not include summer school), you are considered to be a Readmission applicant. 


