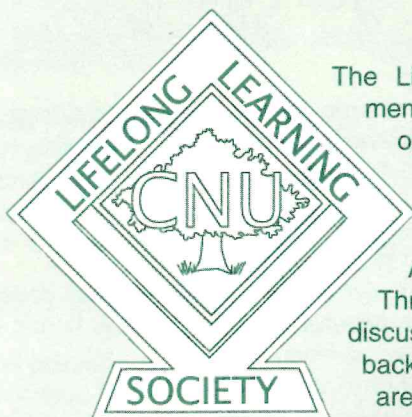


Spring 2006

There are no requirements as to previous educational experience; intellectual curiosity is the only admission requirement. Managed by and for its members, the LLS is a program of the Office of University Advancement and is an affiliate of the Elderhostel Institute Network.

Through a variety of activities – including lectures, courses, study and discussion groups, lunches, dinners and field trips – persons of diverse backgrounds come together to share a common interest in learning. There are no exams or grades in the courses, although some courses include assigned readings and the possible purchase of a text. All persons of

retirement age are encouraged to join if they are interested in being challenged by new ideas in the company of other eager learners. The LLS shares its program with the community by participating in joint learning efforts with other educational and research institutions, retirement groups, industries and museums and by co-sponsoring three annual conferences.

Program Overview

Membership Fee and Benefits

**Southern Caribbean – Holland America

**Cape Cod and Newport
Saturday – Friday, May 20-26, 2006**

Late May is the time to visit Cape Cod, and our trip is no exception! Our seven-day/six-night tour takes us by motor coach for a week of immersion into history, art and architecture of the Cape. Our first stop en route is Wilmington, Del., where we have lunch and a guided tour of the new Delaware Museum of Art. We overnight in Southbury, Conn.

The next morning we continue on to Hyannis, where we have a guided tour, which includes the Kennedy Memorial and Kennedy Museum, before we check in for a three-night stay at The Lighthouse Inn, picturesquely situated on the shores of Nantucket Sound. On Monday morning, we journey round-trip by ferry to Martha's Vineyard for a tour of Edgartown and plenty of time for lunch and browsing. On Tuesday, we again travel by ferry, this time to Nantucket for a day on our own to browse, tour or shop.

On Wednesday, we pack up and head to the Inn at Newport Beach, directly overlooking the beach and the world-renowned mansions beyond, within easy walking distance of the famous Cliff Walk, and just one mile from downtown Newport. Here we enjoy two days of touring, including a harbor cruise, a visit to *The Breakers* (a 70-room Vanderbilt home), *Rosecliff* (home of Nevada Silver Heiress Tessie Oelrichs), *Marble House* (Alva Vanderbilt's "temple to the arts"), and a trip back in time to the 1890s as we visit the Astor's home *Beechwood*. After a full week, we have an early start home on Friday with stops for lunch and dinner en route.
