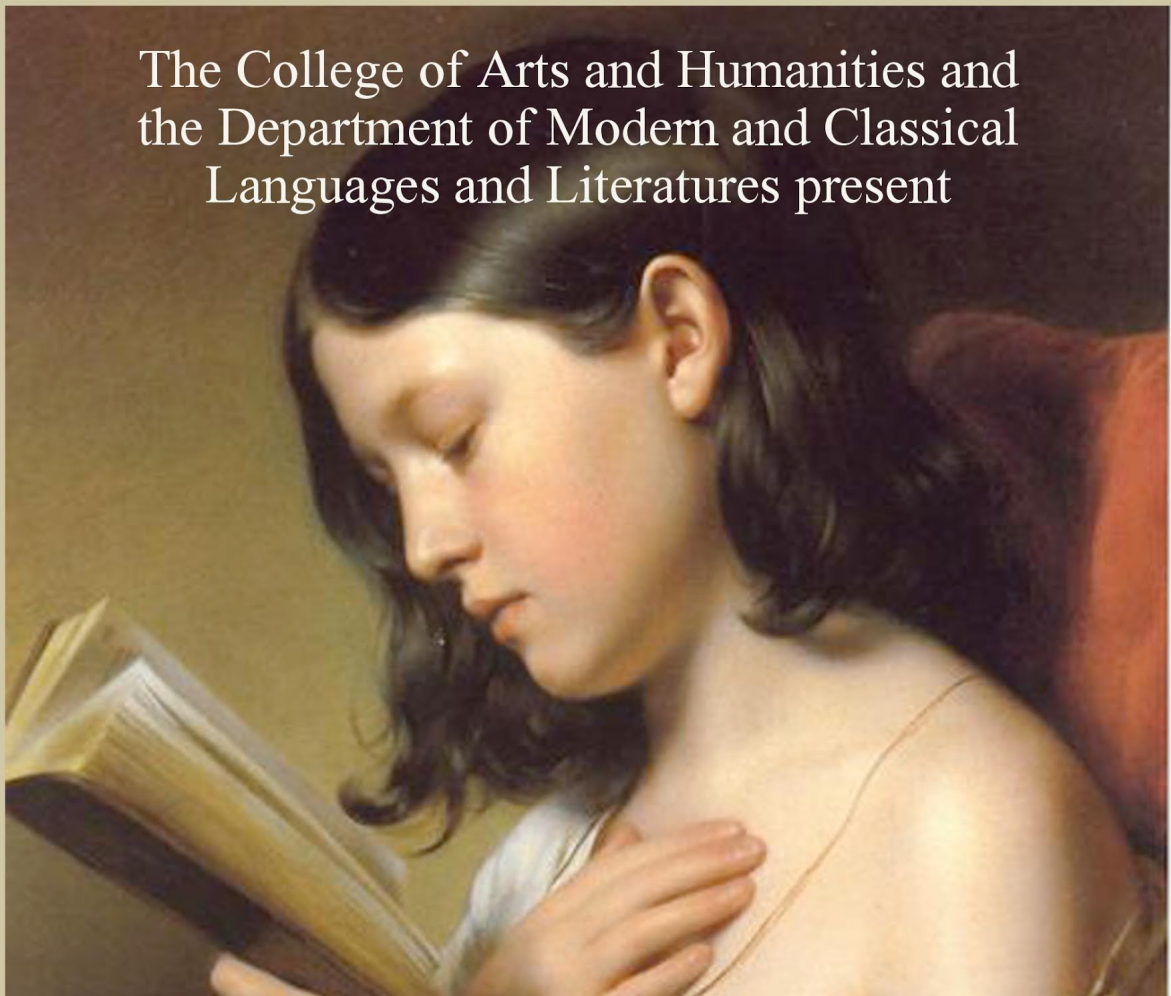

Dr. Lynne Tatlock is the Hortense and Tobias Lewin Distinguished Professor in the Humanities at Washington University in St. Louis. She has published widely on German literature and culture from 1650 to the 1990s with a concentration in the late seventeenth century and the nineteenth century. She has maintained an abiding interest in the novel and its origins, the construction and representation of gender, reading communities, nineteenth-century regionalism and nationalism, the intersection between fiction and other social and cultural discourses. Her recent publications include articles on Catharina Regina von Greiffenberg, film adaptations of *Das doppelte Lottchen*, the American translation of *Marlitt*, and Gustav Freytag's alternative address to national community, as well as two edited volumes *Enduring Loss in Early Modern German Publishing Culture* and *"Reading Nation": German Book History in the Long Nineteenth Century*.
