## History of American Capitalism-NEW COURSE

Professor Frank Garmon will be teaching a new course in the spring on the HIST 395-History of American Capitalism. Students majoring in history, economics, business, American studies, or political science are particularly encouraged to enroll. Professor Garmon is willing to override the course pre-requisite for any interested students, and override forms are available in the history department office. The class helps to fulfill the American history requirement for the history major or minor, and counts as an elective for the American Studies major.

Course Description - HIST 395:

This course traces the development of the American economy from a colonial outpost in the seventeenth century to a global power in the twentieth century. Major themes include the growth of slavery, industrialism in the nineteenth century, and the causes and consequences of the Great Depression. Course readings and assignments will emphasize economic development, entrepreneurship, and the importance of institutions (political, legal, cultural) in shaping American

capitalism. Upon completing the course, students will be able to account for and explain major transformations in American capitalism over the past four hundred years. The class employs an interdisciplinary approach, but does not assume any prior exposure to economics or business concepts.

## **Documentary Making Class open to FRESHMEN**

Freshmen may enroll in a documentary video making class in Spring '17—ENGL 462: Community Storytelling & Documentary Studies (Wed., 4-6:45 p.m.). There are no prerequisites.

Our focus will be on developing techniques for storytelling and for video documentary making, with a focus on the stories community elders. You will spend the semester visiting an elder or couple, spending time in a variety of ways, such as dining together, going to a place of worship together, or maybe just interviewing them in their home. Generally, students produce multimedia content, mixing voice recording, video, still photography, and prose. Students who need recording equipment can borrow from my shelf or from the library media center—or use a SmartPhone. You can see past student work on our www.wisdomofageproject.org/hr website.


