We have a wide variety of hardware and industry standard software that will not only bring your work to life in superior quality, but will dramatically increase your productivity. Among several of our newest editions of the Media Center, we are the most excited about the arrival of our Canon Vixia Camcorders, which capture video footage directly to a SD Card. To compliment our new camcorders and to give you, the cameraman, a seamless video recording experience, we are now in possession of 16 Gigabyte SD cards, which allow multiple hours of uninterrupted

video recording. Interested in video recording, but are pushed away by the though of carrying around big, bulky camera bags? Check out our Flip Slide HD Camcorders. Our Flip cameras are really small, and about the size of a cellphone, so it fits right in your pocket. Another great feature is a built in USB adapter, that extends from its protective cover with but a flick of a switch. Eliminating the need for any extra wires for transferring your footage, further simplifying the process.

Video recording doesn't catch your interest? The Media Center now has Adobe Creative Suite 5 installed in our editing suites and our scanning room. Collection Highlights: How School Can Turn You Crazy by Hunter Ford, Media Student Assistant

The Media Center's Collection space, while already loaded with CDs ideal for a music-theory course and films that are the perfect release for when the homework is complete or just too much, also houses several cinematic gems that urge students to stay afloat, academically and mentally, throughout the semester.

The first of these three films is Ron Howard's 2001, Academy Award-winning "A Beautiful Mind," a biographical drama of the life of MIT professor Dr. John Nash. While the film does not depict how the psychosis externally affects his life and relationships until after he has graduated, the movie provides a glimpse into his psychological decline while it develops under the pressure Nash feels to publish a truly original, mathematic theory while in school.

However, those who hold degrees in Math or Science are not the only targets, as shown in Larry Peerce's "The Bell Jar," which is based on Sylvia Plath's questionably autobiographical novel of the same name (published in 1963). Accepted into a summer internship to write for a magazine in New York City, Esther Greenwood had evoked enough literary potential in herself during her time at university to move towards having her name recognized. However, as is the case with many great writers, she spirals from a comfortable frame of mind to feeling

cut-off from the world around her (trapped in a "bell jar"), having placed tremendous pressure on her abilities in school to attain the position she and her work have achieved. The 1979 classic is a poignant, indepth look at how depression and the academic obligations one must fulfill combine for a self-defeating backfire.

The third film to be mentioned, Darren Aronofsky's 1998 "Pi," reflecting the obsession with mathematics seen in "A Beautiful Mind," will make some wonder if numbers and insanity hold some sort of correlation. Aronofsky's feature debut (feels as though it) zooms in to the socially-stranded life of Max Cohen, a number theorist who believes that, for any dilemma or mere occurrence, there is a string of digits that will explain the phenomena. This theory sends Cohen hunting for answers that even his former math professor advises against, suggesting his search will only further confuse his life.

Together, these three films can serve as a reminder for students to have their scholarly aspirations, but to not allow their efforts toward those goals become their sole purpose for living. Other films in the Media Center's collection carry on this theme, but these three in particular felt like the appropriate wake-up call. Check-out these films and keep an eye on your obsessions.
