NEW SITE FOR C.N.C.

The City of Newport News has made available land for the future site of Christopher Newport College. The land consists of about seventy-five acres located just off Warwick Boulevard on Shoe Lane. The future campus is partially covered with pine trees and the rest is open fields. The site may be approached from all roads around it.

The Governor has recommended to the General Assembly that it appropriate \$456,000 in capital outlay for CNC for the biennium 1962-1964; \$400,000 of this is to be spent for new buildings and the rest for laboratory equipment, books, and educational supplies over the next

two years.

The new classroom building will probably contain about 20,000 square feet. This will possibly house the English, language, history, government, economics, business and psychology departments while the science courses and mathematics department will probably remain in the present building. For a time both buildings will be used until additional funds are appropriated in 1964.

The earliest possible occupation date for the new building will be September 1963. The new building will take about a year to complete, if all goes well. A library, gym, science building and student center are some of the buildings to be built in the coming years.

With the growing population in the Peninsula area, CNC will grow also. In the years to come Christopher Newport Collège will grow and stand high in the

ranks of American colleges.

THE PEPPERMINT TWIST

Christopher Newport's Peppermint Twist Dance given on February second was a success. It was held Friday night from nine to twelve in the second floor hall of the school. The gaily decorated hall, the enthusiastic acceptance by both students and faculty, and the good participation combined to make this the most successful, thus far, social event of the

The hall, skillfully decorated with red and white streamers of crepe paper, was dimly illuminated by lights from the adjoining rooms. Its well polished floor provided ample dancing room in front of the band. The dance music was furnished by the 'Bonnevilles". The band was located across the end of the hall near Professor Usry's office. Carlyle Ashe, vocalist and drummer for the group said that he thought the dance was a success and that they were hopeful of a return engagement. Page 2

It is sincerely hoped that all young men attending CNC will support Professor and the program. He has taken the first step for you; help yourselves and carry his plans through.
