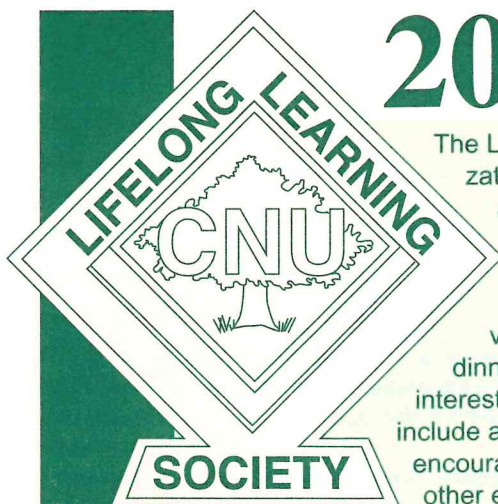


# 2006 FALL PROGRAM

Managed by and for its members, LLS is a program of the Office of University Advancement and is an affiliate of the Elderhostel Institute Network. Through a variety of activities – including lectures, courses, study and discussion groups, lunches, dinners and field trips – persons of diverse backgrounds come together to share a common interest in learning. There are no exams or grades in the courses, although some courses include assigned readings and the possible purchase of a text. All persons of retirement age are encouraged to join if they are interested in being challenged by new ideas in the company of other eager learners. The LLS shares its program with the community by participating in joint learning efforts with other educational and research institutions, retirement groups, industries and museums and by co-sponsoring three annual conferences.

### Program Overview

### Membership Fee and Benefits

### Atlanta and Cities of the South

Saturday – Wednesday, Oct. 7 - 11, 2006

Pack your bags and join us as we search for Scarlett in the New South, enjoying southern history and scenery as we head to Atlanta with many wonderful stops along the way! Our first day's tour highlights the wonderful architecture of Charlotte, N.C., and the Levine Museum of the New South, an interactive history museum that teaches us about a southern society that has shaped the economic, political and cultural life in the South since 1865.

Sunday takes us on to Atlanta, where we spend two days touring the Margaret Mitchell House, the Battle of Atlanta Cyclorama, notable Civil Rights sites in the city, the exciting new Georgia Aquarium (the world's largest!) and the Atlanta History Center with its Tullie Smith House and the elegant Swan House and gardens. Our evenings take us to dinner at the Stately Oaks Plantation with its storyteller on Sunday, and on Monday night, we dine at Mary Mac's Tea Room, followed by a narrated stroll through Centennial Olympic Park.

On Tuesday, we depart for Winston-Salem, where we enjoy an afternoon guided tour of Reynolda House, the R.J. Reynolds mansion and art museum. After an overnight, we visit the Winston-Salem Visitor's Center; take a guided tour of Bethabara Park, the oldest Moravian community in the U.S.; lunch in the Old Salem Tavern with time to browse Old Salem, including admission to the Toy Museum. After a full five days of touring the new South, we depart for home in mid-afternoon.

### From the Frontier Culture Museum to James Madison's "Montpelier"

Friday, Nov. 3, 2006

The fall is a great time of year for a day-trip to the foothills of the Blue Ridge Mountains. Join us for a visit to Staunton and Orange County, as we learn about our past.

Staunton's Frontier Culture Museum reveals the story of the daily lives of the people of Europe and America at five different historic farms, moved from their country of origin and reconstructed at the museum site in Staunton. These working farms allow visitors to observe and participate in life on the farms of England, Germany, Ireland and America.

After lunch and a short stop at the infamous Cheese Shop in Stuart's Draft, we continue on to Orange for a guided tour of "Montpelier," James Madison's lifelong 18th century home. Learn the history of the home during the Madison family's ownership, the changes that occurred when William duPont purchased the mansion and converted it to a hunt country estate and the return to its original size, structure, form and furnishings with the current renovations.

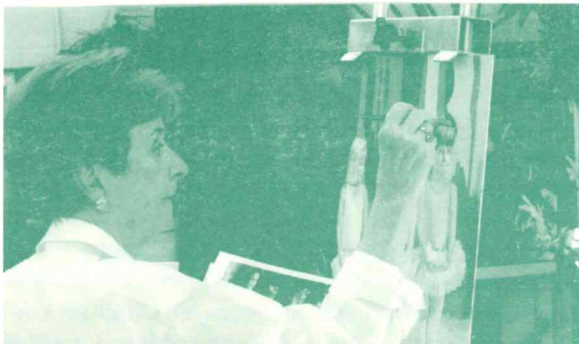
