There are no exams, grades, or homework in the courses. Some courses include assigned readings and the possible purchase of a text. All persons of retirement age are encouraged to join if they are interested in being challenged by new ideas in the company of other eager learners. The LLS shares its program with the community by participating in joint learning efforts with other educational and research institutions, retirement groups, industries, and museums.
