

FOREIGN LANGUAGE PLACEMENT RECOMMENDATIONS

Faculty Senate Subcommittee on the Foreign Language Placement Policies:

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MCLL will provide advising and placement criteria for all courses to the Academic Advising Center.

Current MCLL Policy	Policy Recommended by the Senate Subcommittee
Zero, 1 or 2 years: Completion of CNU language courses: 101-102, 200 or 201 in sequential order for a total of nine semester hours	Zero or 1 years: Completion of CNU language courses: 101-102, 200 or 201 in sequential order (= 9 semester hours) 2 years: Completion of 102, 200 or 201 in sequential order (= 6 semester hours) • students may opt to begin with the 101 course (= 9 semester hours) • students may opt to take a 200-level course <i>with the consent of the instructor</i> (= 3 semester hours)
3 years: Completion of CNU language course 200. The CNU language 201 classes may be taken with the consent of the instructor. 101-102 classes may be audited but not for credit.	3 years: Completion of CNU language course at the 200-level. (= 3 semester hours) Students may opt to take 101-102 classes for grades and elective credit in order to prepare for the 200-level course (= 6 to 9 semester hours). <i>Students are strongly encouraged to take the 200 language class only.</i> <i>Students who intend to continue their studies beyond the fulfillment of the Foreign Language Literacy requirement are strongly encouraged to take a 201 language class.</i>
4 or more years: Completion of CNU 201	4 or more years: Completion of a 200-level

course or higher. The CNU language 200 course may not be taken for credit.	course or higher. (= 3 semester hours) <i>Students are strongly encouraged to take a 300-level course.</i>
If you took a foreign language not currently offered at CNU for 3 or more years: Complete MLAN 308	Students who took a foreign language not currently offered at CNU for 3 or more years may challenge a 200-level course (MLAN 2XX) by successfully completing the 200-level waiver examination offered by Georgetown University in their target language. Students who successfully challenge the course will receive full credit for a 200-level language course (MLAN 2XX). MCLL will need to create an MLAN course number to accommodate these students, e.g. MLAN 2XX: Foreign Language Literacy in <u>(insert language here)</u>, and to run this course through the UCC this year. Students who do not successfully demonstrate 200-level competency at the university level may either: • successfully complete a 200-level course at another institution and transfer the credit (= 3 semester hours) • complete the 101-102, 200 or 201 sequence in a language offered at CNU (= 9 semester hours)

If you are a NATIVE speaker: Complete CNU language course 201 or higher. A 300 level class is recommended.	Native Speakers may challenge a 200-level course in their native language by successfully demonstrating 200-level competency at the university level. Students who successfully challenge the course will receive full credit for a 200-level language course. Students whose native language is not currently offered at CNU will follow the procedure for waiver examinations outlined immediately above. Students who do not successfully demonstrate 200-level competency at the university level may either: • successfully complete a 200-level course or higher. <i>A 300 level class is strongly recommended.</i> (= 3 semester hours) • complete the 101-102, 200 or 201 sequence in another language offered at CNU (= 9 semester hours)
If your secondary program of instruction was in a language other than English: You have fulfilled the requirement! (documentation of the secondary program must be on file in the Registrar's Office)	No change to the original MCLL policy.
If you received a score of 4 or 5 on the Advanced Placement Exam: You have fulfilled the requirement! Students may complete a 300-level course as an elective.	Students who have received a score of 4 or 5 on the Advanced Placement Exam have fulfilled the requirement! Students may opt to take language courses at the 200-level or above for elective credit. <i>300-level courses are strongly recommended.</i>

If you received 12 International Baccalaureate credits: You have fulfilled the requirement! Students may complete a 300-level course as an elective.	No change (12 IB credits = CNU 101-202)
If you have transfer credit from another college or university for a 200-level (intermediate) language course: You have fulfilled the requirement! Students may complete a 300-level course as an elective.	Students who have transfer credit from another college or university for a 200-level (intermediate) language course have fulfilled the requirement! Students may complete additional language courses for elective credit. • Students who have received credit for the equivalent of 201 at CNU may not take 201 or any lower-level course for credit. • Students who have received credit for the equivalent of 202 at CNU may not take 202 or any lower-level course for credit.
